In 1951 the Fort Worth chapter was created and in 2006 the National NCCJ organization disbanded and requested that each local chapter form its own independent 501(c)3 organization. With this separation, the local board members decided to change the name of the organization to the Multicultural Alliance and continue to offer programming.

Today, the mission of the Multicultural Alliance is to promote inclusion, diversity and understanding while working toward eliminating bias, bigotry and oppression in our community.

The Multicultural Alliance provides programming and educational forums that illuminates the opportunities and challenges of living in a pluralistic and harmonious society.

Multicultural Alliance Programs

To achieve our goal of inclusion, understanding and cooperation among people of all identities and backgrounds, the Multicultural Alliance plans and conducts workshops, seminars and programs.

Workshops and Presentations

Multicultural Alliance develops and presents workshops on a wide variety of issues related to diversity, dialogue, civility, and social justice for local schools, organizations, and corporations.

Interfaith Seminary Retreat: Sharing our Faith Traditions

Seminarians from religious graduate institutions participate in this interreligious retreat. The themes and discussions are led by representatives of various religions, including faculty from seminaries and clergy from churches, mosques, and synagogues. The goal is to help prepare outstanding seminarians for their future roles as religious leaders in an interfaith and pluralistic community.



Camp CommUNITY®

This leadership institute (formerly known as Anytown, TX) was established in 1982. Camp CommUNITY is a 5-day residential experience, bringing together selected high school students throughout Tarrant County from various backgrounds, beliefs and opinions. The goal is to help students learn how to live successfully in a pluralistic and harmonious society by acquiring the skills and insights to gain personal knowledge, create friendships across cultures, and promote positive change. Under the guidance of a skilled staff, Delegates recognize and discuss social issues encountered on a daily basis and work with one another to create an inclusive community where everyone can: Be yourself, Be heard, Belong.



Multicultural Alliance Award

This award was given in 1952 by NCCJ and continues today. The award is bestowed to a person or organization who exemplifies the purpose and mission of the Multicultural Alliance and is presented at the Multicultural Alliance Annual Awards Dinner.

Interfaith Dialogues

Connecting communities of faith, individuals participate in six sessions that will enrich their own faith tradition and learn the traditions, experiences and practices of the religion of others. Through guided dialogue, mutual respect and cooperation can occur. MCA also coordinates the Northeast Tarrant County Daughters of Abraham group.
